

## How can I help?

#### Generally

- Support federal regulatory language affirming biomass as a carbon-neutral, renewable energy source.

- Protect consumers' right to heat their homes using wood and wood pellet appliances that comply with emissions limits already outlined in federal regulations.

## Specifically:

### Farm Bill

- Support the ongoing inclusion of the Advanced Biofuels Payment Program in the Farm Bill.
- Support the continuation of the Community
  Wood Energy Grants in the Farm Bill

Wood innovation grants

#### **Tax Credits**

- Raise the cap on biomass stove installations included in the Residential Clean Energy Property Credit to \$8,000 to incentivize the installation of whole home wood pellet boiler systems.
- Expand the Clean Energy Property Credit to commercial installations.

## Renewable Fuels Standard

 Direct the EPA to authorize a pathway within the Renewable Fuel Standard for wood pellet producers to generate Renewable Identification Numbers.
